Minnél hamarabb készülünk fel erre annál kisebb lesz a sokk amikor ez meg fog történni. Minnél kisebb az energiaigényünk, minnél közelebb van a munkahelyünk és minnél közelebbi helyről jön az élelmiszer utánpótlás,

annál kevésbé függünk az olaj áráról és elérhető ségétől.

Románia rossz irányba halad. Még több árút importál mint valaha,a lakosság bankkölcsönöket vesz fel hogy megvásárolja az első autót vagy egy nagyobbat amelyik még több benzint fogyaszt., az emberek egyre távolabb laknak a munkahelyüktől.

Az angliai külvárosban az emberek azt sem tudják kik a szomszédok. Beülnek az autóba,mérföldeket vezetnek amíg a munkahelyükre érnek,soha nem mennek el a helyi kocsmába-(a legtöbb már évek óta be van zárva)-mivel ha vezetnek nem ihatnak. Peace Corps Romania Environmental Program

If you've spent any length of time working in the Romanian non-profit world, you may have come across a Peace Corps volunteer. Peace Corps volunteers can be found living and working in nearly every county throughout Romania, in schools, city halls, small businesses, and both governmental and non-governmental organizations. The Peace Corps, a United States government agency, is both a cultural exchange and a development program; it was created in 1961 by former U.S. president John F. Kennedy, and currently operates in 73 countries. It has operated in Romania since 1991.

There are approximately 140 Peace Corps Volunteers now serving in Romania, and approximately 20% of these work in the environmental sector. Peace Corps' environmental program aims to support local communities and organizations in their work to raise environmental awareness, and to protect and improve the environment.

Read on for profiles of two Peace Corps Romania volunteers and their host organizations.

Doug Knight, Cluj Napoca

Peace Corps volunteer Doug Knight has been in Romania since February 2007. He works with Clubul Montan Apuseni (The Apuseni Mountain Club) in Cluj Napoca, assisting them in their efforts to develop eco-tourism packages and provide nature education to children from the Apuseni mountain region. Doug's role with Clubul Montan Apuseni is to help the organization with fundraising, grantwriting, and development of eco-tourism packages. He also collaborates with Ecouri Verzi (Green Echoes), another Cluj-based organization, to develop both green spaces throughout Cluj Napoca, and environmental education programs for youth. Other projects Doug has been involved in as a Peace Corps volunteer have been the founding and development of the WWOOF network in Romania, writing environmental education lesson plans for other Peace Corps volunteers, and helping to network several environmental NGOs in Cluj Napoca as they develop into a strong community.

Ed Klaunig, Agnita

Ed Klaunig, a Peace Corps volunteer in Agnita, has been in Romania since February 2007. He works with the Local Action Group (LAG). LAG is currently working to access the EU's Rural Development structural funds (LEADER), in order to plan and implement large scale rural development in its micro-region (in eastern Sibiu county). The organization is a collaborative effort among local activists and stakeholders who represent the various interests of the micro-region. LAG attempts to include members who represent the diverse make-up of the area, including women, people of different ages, different ethnicities, and different religions. During his time in Romania, Ed has also helped to establish WWOOF Romania, and is currently working to strengthen the organization, attract more Romanian farmers willing to host volunteers, and generally promote WWOOF throughout Romania.

Steven Hermans Volunteered at Low Impact Living Transilvania (LILT) for 3 Weeks in June. Here is his account of his how he spent his time.

Volunteering for Sara and Douglas has been an extremely rewarding experience for me. I was very happy here and enjoyed every day. It didn't take long for the house in Huedin to feel like a home to me. But it's the house in Domos I fell in love with. Not only for the village atmosphere and the wonderful people who live there, but for the charming old building itself and especially the garden. I saw it growing and transforming and I was proud that some of it was my work. We didn't spend much time in Alunis, but I think that house has the same potential. So, what is so great about LILT? It is a chance to explore and live a lifestyle that is long lost in industrialised nations like the one I come from. You get the chance to meet some of the wonderful Kalotaszeg people and learn about their traditions, and how and why to live a low impact life. I learned a lot about organic gardening and the local fauna and flora and I grew confident in building and gardening, things I had little experience in up until now. Most importantly, we had a lot of fun. Working and living intersect and overlap - philosophical discussions while weeding, planning for the next day over dinner - so I never felt I was actually working; everything is just life, what you do, and it feels good and purposeful. To give an idea, here are some of the things I did in the three weeks I spent with Douglas and Sara: I made 3 plant beds and planted and sowed different vegetables, staked and strung up beans and tomatoes, did weeding, went to the film festival in Cluj, fixed a toilet door, built a temporary bathroom, dug a toilet, helped a neighbour turning her hay, made a lot of salads, tested soil for earth building and fixed some holes in the floor with earth, sickled and scythed large areas of wild garden, etc. In conclusion, I had a wonderful time and can recommend everyone interested in exploring this kind of lifestyle a stay in Huedin. For myself, the future might show that this has been a life-changing experience, affirming the ideas I already had and inspiring me to be active and live according to my convictions.

Pope hits out at consumer culture

Pope Benedict XVI has attacked popular culture and consumerism in a formal address to tens of thousands of young Roman Catholics. The pontiff also warned that natural resources were being squandered, in the speech in Sydney, Australia. "Our world has grown weary of greed, exploitation and division, of the tedium of false idols and piecemeal responses, and the pain of false promises," he told the crowd. There were numerous signs something was amiss in modern society, the pontiff said. He spoke of "scars which mark the surface of our earth - erosion, deforestation, the squandering of the world's mineral and ocean resources in order to fuel an insatiable consumption". Food waste on 'staggering' scale

People are needlessly throwing away 3.6m tonnes of food each year in England and Wales, research suggests. The Waste & Resources Action Programme (WRAP) found that salad, fruit and bread were most commonly wasted and 60% of all dumped food was untouched. The study analysed the waste disposed of by 2,138 households. The study found that £9bn of avoidable food waste was disposed of in England and Wales each year. It is mostly food that could have been consumed if it had been better stored or managed, or had not been left uneaten on a plate. Environment Minister Joan Ruddock said the findings were "staggering" at a time of global food shortages and WRAP added it was an environmental issue. [See BBC news report](#)

Pressure on Gabriel Resources Continues

Alburnus Maior the organisation fighting to stop the destruction of Rosia Montana and the surrounding area if a large open cast mine goes ahead is continuing to keep the pressure on Gabriel Resources the Canadian mining company involved. Alburnus Maior has written an open letter to Thomas Kaplan, a large investor in Gabriel Resources, who also is the main financial backing behind an NGO called 'Pantera', a global wild cat conservation group. Through his company, 'Electrum', Thomas Kaplan owns over 14% of Gabriel Resources. He is executive chairman and co-director with three others, including world famous cat biologist Dr. Alan Rabinowitz, of the Panthera Foundation. Mr. Kaplan has been quoted as saying:

"It is my privilege that I can apply the lessons I have learned in other fields, and indeed the important contacts that my professional life affords me, to drive a highly aggressive environmental agenda. The opportunity to fund and reward those who have given their lives to the pursuit of preserving the big cats and, equally importantly, the habitats and eco-systems which sustain them, is the closing of a virtuous circle that began in my youth."

In their letter Alburnus Maior point out the the Apuseni Mountains are one of the last strongholds of the European lynx and that the mining operations could lead to its disappearance in the area. The letter ends with these words:

We commend you on your environmental and conservation leadership. However, financial support for a project such as Rosia Montana is clearly incompatible with such an environmental agenda. We urge you to disassociate yourself with a project that clearly stands contrary to environmental and social principles, by selling your stake in Gabriel Resources.

REN says however important the environment is to T. Kaplan, the opportunity to make a financial killing is obviously greater. Only when we put the environment firmly before profit can we hope to

create a more planet friendly society.

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New Guest House in Rosia Montana

Another successful project in Rosia Montana is the La Gruber guest house, which will be opening later this month. Stephanie from Alburnus Maior writes:

In late August we will launch our first pilot project at Rosia Montana. The guest house in the centre of Rosia Montana has bunk beds, a self catering kitchen and wireless internet access. Traditional breakfast and laundry services will also be available. The project was entirely funded by individual donations.

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Campaign against Formaldehyde Plant in Sebes Seeks Funding.

The Centre for the Development of Environmental Resources' (CIDRM) is seeking finances to continue its lawsuits against the Kronospan formaldehyde plant in Sebes. **Ramona Dumnicioiu** reports on CIDRM.

Apart from the "Save Rosia Montana" campaign, CIDRM is closely involved in a series of other campaigns in Romania, working in partnership with other NGOs or assisting the efforts of directly affected citizens. These include the campaign against the plans of multinational, 'Kronospan,' to expand their industrial installation which produces formaldehyde, in the town of Sebes (Alba County); the campaign against the development of an open cast limestone mine and adjacent lime factory in the picturesque village of Geomal(Alba County); assistance on environmental law issues for the campaign against an Italian mining company's proposal to open a sienite mine in the village of Ditrau (Harghita County); assistance on environmental law issues against the plans of the local authorities to combat floods by regularizing the banks of Cris river in Oradea city (Bihor County) etc.

CIDRM's lawyers count amongst the best environmental lawyers in the country and the NGO has secured important legal precedents all over Romania. CIDRM was also a partner of InfOMG in the "The National Information Tour on the risks of Genetically Modified Organisms."

To date the CIDRM team which includes its lawyers has carried out all its activities on a pro-bono basis in order to show the NGO's expertise and capacity. The NGO now needs funding due to the increasing amount of cases and campaigns needing support. In particular, CIDRM urgently requires funding to continue its work against the Kronospan formaldehyde plant in Sebes. The environmental authorities in Alba county have been weak in enforcing legal provisions despite overwhelming local opposition tot the plant. CIDRM therefore seeks to increase the pressure on the local authorities by increasing public awareness, public participation, access to information and justice for the citizens of Sebes city who will be directly affected by the production of formaldehyde on an industrial scale. Formaldehyde is a chemical listed as highly cancerous by the World Health Organization. Many people are already aware of the pollution and public health problems in Sebes, due to the activity of Kronospan's wood processing factory, which is very visible from the road, as you drive from Alba to Sibiu.

CIDRM recently submitted a project proposal for co-funding to the Environmental Partnership Foundation. It was approved and CIDRM now needs to secure the remaining amount (7.657 EUR

Adevarul Tuesday 22nd June

Travelling from Bucharest to the Black Sea coast means many delays which the authorities are trying to resolve. The congestion is due to speed limits and a lack of turning spaces. The solutions are to restrict heavy goods vehicles travelling on this route at weekends, and to publicise an alternative route to take. The ultimate solution will be to use the 'Motorway to the Sun' soon to be built. Building roads is how problems of congestion are being solved all over Romania.

REN asks why the authorities are not considering more sustainable solutions such as improved public transport/car sharing. In the long term, what happens when these new roads become congested?

Evenimentul Zilei 30th June

In Brasov nearly 100 cyclists took part in a demonstration to raise awareness about the lack of cycle lanes in the town. There is only one cycle lane in Brasov; it is one hundred metres long and runs along the pavement in front of the town hall.

Evenimentul Zilei 30th June

An optional class, 'The Ecology of the Delta Dunare' can be taken in Junior schools (Gymnasium) from the beginning of the next academic year. 'Salvati Delta' and 'Mai Mult Verde', in collaboration with the Minister of the Environment and Education, launched the project, 'Cartea Dunarii Albastre' on 29th June. The pilot project will involve five hundred students and twenty two teachers from all the schools in the region. The hope is that the young people will become a valuable resource and will go on to educate others they come into contact with regarding the waters and ecosystems of the Delta.

Faclia 4th July

Reports on a small milk and cheese factory in the 'comuna' of Iclod, Oltenia called Picolact. This region is well known for its dairy production. The factory was set up in 1998 in the courtyard of a local smallholder. They have recently moved into a modern dairy kept to EU standards. The boss Darius Patrus heads a team of 25 workers Faclia reports all have good work conditions.

Monitorul de Cluj 4th July

By 2015 Romanian needs to have 20% of its land certified Bio. Now only 1% of the land is Organic. Marion Cioceanu from Asociatiei Operatorilor din Agricultura Ecologica Bio Romania

says that the farmers need to receive the subsidies for conversion as they do in the rest of the EU. Another representative from Bio Romania has said that this year will be a record for production of bio wheat and peas (4 ton/hectare). This association is directing its comments directly to the Ministry of Agriculture. Their motive is that Romanian children and the sick have a right to healthy, organic local food. At the moment 95% of organic production is exported; and costs double the price of non-organic counterparts in supermarkets.

REN believes it is better to buy local food rather than Organic (if this means imports). Support your local market, those in your community and not foreign owned supermarkets/imported goods.

Gardianul Transilvania 4th July

The Train system is in crisis according to a survey conducted by Price Waterhouse and McKinsey's on CFR. CFR Departments, responsible for train infrastructure, transportation of goods, and of people, are all in financial chaos. They are not restructuring the costs, and the management is not efficient. Stefan Roseanu of AFER (Asociatiei Industrii Feroviare din Romania) says that train travel is chronically underfunded and that this is a political issue where rail infrastructure is not made into something reliable, efficient and attractive.

REN Says: It appears car manufacturers have a loud voice in Romanian ministries. Across Western Europe fast rail lines are being built to relieve pressure on roads, reduce the impact of travel on climate change, and create a modern, fast, safe transport system. Once again Romania is applying failed 20th century solutions and not modern 21st century solutions.

Adevarul Verde 22nd July

A survey carried out by Naturaland found that less than 1% of Romanians eat eco certified food, and that these eco-shoppers are middle class between the ages of 26 and 39. The reason for the small figure is high costs of such food and availability. Romania is an exporter of raw materials for eco certified food, but by the time the finished products return, they are four times more expensive than products produced in Romania.

Adevarul Verde 22nd July

Sorin Adam Matei argues against a notable Romanian Professor's anti capitalist stand made in 1990. This professor of history and sociology asked why anyone would need more than one type of Salami. Matei believes we need a variety of everything to cater for the ever increasing range of tastes/individualism in the world. He suggests that Capitalism doesn't always get it right in predicting the needs of the consumer, but that on the whole capitalism and consumerism make for an interesting life.

REN Says 'an interesting life' that is destroying our planet, of which there is only one.

Ziua 2nd August

Bears are to be culled in Brasov. This announcement comes after another person was killed on 1st August by a bear 500 metres from the city centre. There is a whole list of recent fatalities caused by bears entering the city for food.

REN Says. Aren't bears coming into the city because their natural environment and food source is being destroyed? Is the rubbish being regularly removed, and efficiently disposed off, so as not to attract bears or other animals? In Yellowstone park in the USA removing all rubbish (ie food for hungry bears) has led to a massive reduction in bear attacks on humans. Aren't bears a protected species? Why did the killing of a girl by a wild dog several months ago in Romania (again a fatality among a whole list of recent fatalities), not provoke a similar outcry?

About the Rest of the World

Richmond Informer 6th June (UK)

Kingston University's Clare McCormack heads the team of researchers who have created the first wind up compost toilet. Winding aerates the waste before a pipe transports the waste to a collection point. Aerating dries the waste very quickly which means it turns into a dry compost, and can be used to fertilise the garden.

Adevarul Verde 24th June

East Germany has built the largest photovoltaic power station in the world. It covers an area of 200 football pitches and produces 40 megawatts at full capacity.

From October this year for every 20m² of building in the town of Marburg, a photovoltaic panel will be compulsory. Each panel costs 5000 Euros. Anyone not complying will be fined 1000 Euros.

Extracts from letter (we have not corrected language errors)
